# **How Does Sleep Affect Your Health?** Find out at the September WWCA Meeting

FOR YEARS, we've been told that exercise and eating a proper diet will keep you heart healthy. Well, there's more to the story. How we sleep also has a big impact on our heart and our overall health.

It's the time of year when we tend to get less sleep. Kids are back to school. Work gets busier trying to meet year-end goals. And Daylight Savings Time is around the corner. As a result, we tend to sleep less, eat less healthy, and are constantly on the go.

If you also suffer from sleep apnea, a serious sleep disorder where you actually stop breathing sometimes hundreds of times per night, you may be at risk of developing a heart attack.

# 39th Ward Report



MANY THANKS TO the West Walker representatives who attended the Thai Town public presentation this summer. This development is proposed for the old 17th District Police Station at 4416 N. Pulaski. While not technically in the West Walker boundaries, this has the potential to attract new retail

development to our community.

Arun Sampanthavivat, owner and executive chef of Arun's Restaurant, presented his proposal to convert the space to a multi-use building that features Thai-influenced retail and non-profit uses. Plans include a casual dining Thai restaurant, a spa and wellness center, and office space for the Thai American Association. The public meeting was the first step in the process to develop this property.

Street resurfacing is scheduled to start in the next few

months. In the West Walker area, Belle Plaine from Pulaski to Hamlin will be resurfaced. Along with the resurfacing, crosswalk ramps will be replaced according to current city specifications. We recognize that street resurfacing can be an inconvenience to people living on the street and we appreciate your patience during the process.

Together with the 17th Police, I'm sponsoring a Landlord Training Seminar on Thursday, September 23 from 6 to 9 p.m. at the 17th District Police Station, 4650 N. Pulaski. Landlords and property owners will receive information on how to screen tenants, responsibilities of landlords, tenant/landlord rights, and the eviction process. If you are a landlord, or if you know someone who is, please consider attending this free meeting. I've sat in at past trainings and was very impressed with the information presented at the session.

# **Summer Green Garden Report**

I HOPE EVERYONE has been staying cool in this year where we've experienced the highest average temperatures, globally, ever recorded. As of this writing, Chicago has had the longest streak ever—60 days—of days higher than 79 degrees. The previous record was 43 days.

I'm happy to say some things in my garden have helped me to manage. My rain barrel has provided water.

Allowing the little bit of grass I have to go dormant helps to save water for the vegetables. My perennials are growing bigger, providing some shade to garden beds, helping to retain moisture and soak



up rain from thunderstorms. A good mulch this spring also helped.

I've had a record harvest of tomatoes and beans, although the cool-season vegetables didn't fare so well. I've had some nice corn cobs too. Now I'm waiting to see how the melons, squash, and pumpkins do. It's been quite a battle with powdery mildew, due to the humidity.

I had an exciting time helping a friend move a beehive to her rooftop in Uptown. I'm happy to report sightings of many varieties of pollinators—bees, butterflies, and moths. I planted milkweed this year, for the Monarch butterflies, and have seen several Swallowtails and Admirals too, as well as the smaller varieties.

This year, I hope to hear more from my readers. Please write and share "green" projects you have worked on at home or those you might be interested in starting. If you need a little help or encouragement, maybe someone in the neighborhood will be able to jump in. Maybe we can feature some in the *Wire*!

Some of us have been talking about starting a neighborhood garden walk. If you'd be interested in participating next year, let me know. I'd also like to start a "sustainability" group in West Walker. If that's on your mind, like it is always on mine, let's get together!

## **Pantry Engages Program Development Consultant**

The Irving Park Community Food Pantry engaged Jamie Stanesa as a program-development consultant to design, implement, and provide oversight for the Pantry's new Enhanced Client Services Initiative. The program is designed to connect clients with additional community and governmental services that can help them and their families. Funded by a grant from The Chicago Community Trust, Jamie will also help source and train a part-time Client Services Coordinator (CRC).

**More Grants:** The Pantry received a \$1,600 grant from the Archdiocese of Chicago's Operation Rice Bowl to continue operating its nutrition class. It also received two new refrigerators from a Greater Chicago Food Depository grant.




