## **WWCA General Meeting Minutes**

#### From Tuesday, March 15th, 2011

#### Officers in attendance:

Mike Webber – President Davor Engel – Vice President Jack Prikos - Treasurer

General meeting commenced at 7:06 p.m.

The December general meeting Minutes were approved by voice vote.

The Treasurer's report was approved by voice vote.

#### **General reminders:**

An all 17th Dist Beats Town Hall Meeting will be held at 5040 N Pulaski on March 24, 2010 at 7:00 p.m. Neighbors were encouraged to attend the Town Hall as well as CAPS meetings to express concerns. Neighbors were encouraged to contact Michelle Kaicener for Green concerns and green gardening advice. The 26th Annual Garage Sale will be held May 14, 2011 – applications are in the Wire. The next WWCA general meeting is April 19, 2011.

Mike Webber discussed the primary results of the community surveys. A discussion followed regarding possible improvement or changes within the WWCA which could address some of the concerns and weaknesses identified by the survey. Suggestions included posting narrative responses to the surveys on the WWCA website, A WWCA Facebook page, a WWCA Yahoo group and increased direct e-mail communication.

Davor Engel discussed the process the Zoning Committee followed in reaching a recommendation in favor of the residential development proposal at 4247-4259 N. Elston Avenue. A discussion followed regarding the project's merits and the need for further review and action by Alderman Laurino and the city Zoning Board. There was general agreement that there was a need to develop a mechanism to proactively attract and develop commercial and retail concerns to the community, although less concensus as to the nature of those concerns.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:48 p.m.

## **CAPS** Report

In lieu of regular beat meetings, the 17th District had its Annual Town Hall Meeting on Wednesday, March 23rd. We were introduced to Commander Melissa A. Staples who has replaced Commander Michael Mealer as 17th District Commander. Sergeant Ken Pang, our new CAPS officer, provided an overview of reported crimes in 2009 and 2010 as well as trends for early 2011 versus early 2010. For both time periods, automobile thefts and thefts from automobiles have increased dramatically. Some information from the Chicago Police Department regarding prevention:

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If you make it easy for someone to steal from your vehicle, chances are they will. So minimize the opportunity by practicing the following safety tips.

- Always lock your vehicle and take your keys.
- Never leave a spare set of keys in the vehicle such as in a magnetic box, above the visor or under the hood. Thieves ALWAYS check these areas.
- Always park in a well-lighted area.
- When parking your vehicle, always make sure the windows are tightly closed.
- Keep all valuables and packages out of sight, e.g. CDs and CD players, cellular phones, briefcases, computers, spare change, clothing, chargers, iPods and GPS devices and suction cups to secure the same.
- Do not place valuable items inside the trunk in plain view of the public. Instead, secure your items in the trunk prior to arriving at your destination.
- Anything of value left in your car attracts thieves.
- Remember, a thief will break your \$100 car window to steal your \$10 sunglasses.

Recent graffiti and tagging is gradually being removed. With the warmer months approaching, there is a tendency to see more graffiti so please continue to report graffiti to: (1) 311 for graffiti removal (don't forget to ask for a tracking number so you can call back to get a status report if the removal is not completed) and (2) the 17th District (CAPS.017district@chicagopolice.org) by sending a photo of the graffiti along with the address or location so the graffiti can be logged in its database.

CAPS meetings for our beat are currently held monthly at the 17th District Police Station, 4650 N. Pulaski, in the Community Room. Meetings begin at 7 p.m. on the third Wednesday of the month and typically last one hour. The next regularly scheduled meeting for Beat 1723 is Wednesday, April 20. As always, call 911 to report suspicious activity or individuals in your neighborhood and provide a detailed physical description of the individuals involved in any incident, including clothing, shoes and vehicle descriptions.

## 39th Ward Report



I'm sure that many of you were aware that the Chicago Public Schools and the Board of Education proposed to place a new school, Audubon High School, into the existing Marshall Middle School building. After meetings and much public discourse, both pro and con, CPS withdrew their proposal for the new high school. According

to CPS, the design team looked at Marshall Middle School and came to the conclusion that the facility would not fit their needs. In addition, the lack of consensus among the community contributed to the decision to abandon the plans for a high school at Marshall. Bottom line – Marshall Middle School will remain in the facility, KidWatch will remain in the facility, and Audubon High School will not be moving into that location.

The city's Annual Spring Clean and Green is scheduled for Saturday, April 16. This marks the 22nd year that the city has sponsored the community clean-up. In past years, we've always had a good response from West Walker neighbors who pitch in to clean-up their streets,

alleys and blocks. If you are interested in participating, please contact Jonathan in my office at 773-736-5594. CNT Energy, a non-profit in Chicago that does energy efficiency programming, is partnering with People's Gas and the Chicagoland Natural Gas Savings Program to offer the Chicagoland Air Sealing Pilot Program, available to residential customers in buildings of 1-2 units until May 2011. The Chicagoland Natural Gas Savings Program is offering 85% rebates (capped at \$1,000) for Air Sealing and 75% rebates (capped at \$750) for Attic Insulation. In addition to the rebate, participants will receive free radon testing, a free Energy Audit focused on energy efficiency and safety, quality work from pre-approved contractors committed to energy efficiency, and follow-up testing to verify the home's improved performance. The program is open to homeowners with single family homes and twoflats. Applications must be received by May 31. For more information, visit http://www.cntenergy.org/buildings/ Chicagoland-air-sealing-pilot.



The Three Brothers Garden committee would like to thank the many volunteers and donors who helped make the event a success. Net proceeds of the event were approximately \$2,000, which will be used for the installation of an irrigation system in the garden. State Representative Deborah Mell contributed \$1,000 to the water project, and a \$3,000 grant from the Marx Foundation was secured by Alderman Margaret Laurino. Funds raised to bring water onto the site will make watering the garden more efficient in terms of volunteer labor and water use. Installation of the irrigation system is expected to be complete in time for the spring planting season.

Vegetables grown in the garden are donated to the Irving Park Community Food Pantry. Since 2009, over 1,300 pounds of fresh vegetables have been distributed to pantry clients. 

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#### Seanachai Theatre's Successful Year at the Irish-American Heritage Center

By the time you read this article, Seanachai Theatre will have ended its 2010-2011 season, its first full season in their new home at the Irish-American Heritage Center. It was quite a season!

It was a special honor to welcome the Irish Consul General, Martin Rouine, to Seanachai's board of directors. Mr. Rouine enthusiastically joined

the board after experiencing the quality of Seanachai productions first-hand. He was not alone in that opinion. All three of Seanachai's productions at the IAHC, Dancing at Lughnasa, The Weir, and That Was Then have been recommended by the Joseph Jefferson Award committee for full consideration for Jeff Award nominations. The Jeff Awards are the Chicago equivalent of New York's Tony Awards.

In the fall and again in the spring, Seanachai offered a dinner-theatre option which received rave reviews from guests who enjoyed a gourmet meal with wine, coffee, and dessert; a pre-show presentation by an ensemble member who shared key points about the play and the playwright; the play itself; and a post-show discussion with the actors following the performance. The dinner-theatre night for That Was Then was especially fun since guests enjoyed the very foods eaten during the play by the actors – Caesar salad, olive tapenade, Coq au vin, fragrant rice, Arrabbiata meatballs, and for dessert – Castro's bombe. No matter how scary that sounds, Castro's bombe is a delicious dessert of vanilla ice cream with pineapple ginger sauce, topped by toasted walnuts.

In February, Seanachai partnered with the Irish-American Heritage Center, a number of local spa treatment providers, and local artists to present a Girls Night Out fundraiser event. It was a beautiful evening, inspiring a quantity of enthusiastic feedback from all who participated. The already-beautiful Fifth Province Pub was further transformed with fairy lights, tea candles, winter branches, and rich fabrics in reds, purples, silvers, and cream. \$25 admission

(fully deductible as a tax write-off) entitled guests to all of the food and drink they wished for as well as the opportunity to buy beautiful handmade goods from local artists and to sign up for manicures, pedicures, paraffin hand treatments, massages, reflexology, and Tarot Card reading. The food was mostly homemade and absolutely delectable! Homemade olive tapenade, lox/crème fraiche/capers, spinach-artichoke dip, cheese asparagus tartlets, quiche tartlets, an array of cheeses and fruits, raw vegetables and dip, homemade chocolate covered strawberries, homemade white and dark chocolate covered pretzels, brownies, Madelines, champagne punch, red and white wines, and Dove chocolate martinis.



#### **Legislative Update**

State lawmakers have begun the process of negotiating and crafting a state budget. The passage of recent budgeting reforms by the General Assembly help ensure an end to business as usual when it comes to how the state spends tax dollars. The governor submitted a proposed budget that included increases in spending that exceeds our resources. With these new reforms in place, we cannot continue down the path of living beyond our means.

The General Assembly will no longer follow a budgeting process that takes the appropriations made to state agencies from last year and simply add more funds. These agencies will have to justify the need for all of their spending requests and learn how to do more with less.

Under the new budgeting process, the House Revenue Committee will be tasked with determining actual anticipated revenues that the state will be able to appropriate. As the Revenue Committee determines anticipated revenues, the House's appropriations committees are given a finite spending limit. The state will not be allowed to spend money that is not supported by existing sources.

Just like our families that have to live on a budget, the state must also start to live within its means. Through my work on the Elementary and Secondary Education Appropriations Committee and in my other duties as your state representative, I pledge to do everything I can to help pass a state budget that does more with less. I am committed to working with my colleagues in Springfield to get the state's finances back on the road toward fiscal solvency.

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

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#### Gardeners: Resist the Urge!

After a long, cold, snowy winter like we've just had in Chicago, we gardeners are more than eager to get out and get to work clearing and cleaning, but I urge you to hold off a bit...for now anyway.

Winter and early spring in the garden is basically a series of freeze and thaw cycles. These cycles create tiny air spaces called "pores" in the soil which are essential for healthy plants. Soil is a living organism and as such needs oxygen to exist. Without adequate oxygen, the soil becomes waterlogged and roots of plants will rot.

If you dig or even walk on your beds too early when the soil is wet, you will do a lot of damage to your soil by eliminating these air spaces. If you must walk in your garden, it is recommended that you lay down a plank of wood and walk on that instead.

You should also resist the urge to clean up your beds too early. Even though we are all anxious to see what is starting to grow, it is better to wait a bit. Hopefully you have left the leaves on your flower beds last fall. These leaves help regulate the temperature of the soil. Removing this organic cover will expose tender shoots to our unpredictable spring weather. The old leaves will decompose on their own and give essential nutrients back into the soil.

As consistently warmer weather arrives you can start to remove the leaves to expose the crowns of the plants, but do not put the leaves in the trash can. Leave this material around the roots of the plants instead.

If you can live with the look of the decomposing leaves for a few extra weeks until the plant fully leafs out, your garden will thank you for it by being more productive!
