Ornamental Grass

For a neater look, now is the time to cut back your ornamental grasses. Grab a handful of grass and cut it to about 6 inches with garden shears or scissors. You should do this now, before the new growth starts and it will be very difficult to remove the old grass without damaging the new grass. Some grasses have very sharp edges so you will want to wear gloves. You might consider leaving some of the trimmings scattered

around your yard. Birds love to make nests out of it.

WWCA General Meeting Minutes

April 19, 2011

Meeting opened at 7:07 p.m. with a Call to Order and introductions. April Minutes were approved. Officers present were Mike Webber, Jack Prikos and Carol Valentino-Barry.

Scott Goldstein of Teska Associates spoke about Understanding and Implementing Neighborhood Change. Mr. Goldstein pointed out that banks like to invest in projects that are supported by the community. Moreover, a repopulation of the city of Chicago is happening and demographics are growing and shifting. He believes neighborhood improvements generally do the following:

- Build on Existing Assets
- Capitalize on Recent Improvements and Increase Physical and Social (investment in quality of life) Capital.

Mr. Goldstein shared some specific ideas that have been successful and could apply to ours.

- Revitalize Existing Businesses and take advantage of the Small Business Improvement grant (SBIF)*
- Enhance Broadband infrastructure by creating WiFi Hot Spot (Businesses on the Southside successfully did this.)
- Enhance Streetscape

- Establish Bikeway Connections to Gompers Park Bike Route

Mr. Goldstein also pointed to the northeast corner of Pulaski and Elston as a possible area for development. It is a high profile, well travelled intersection.

Meeting adjourned at 7:48 p.m.

* The SBIF program uses tax increment financing (TIF) revenues to help owners of commercial and industrial properties within specific TIF districts to repair or remodel their facilities for their own business or on behalf of tenants. The SBIF Program provides grants in the form of reimbursement that are 25-75% of the total eligible project costs, not to exceed \$150,000 per applicant, with the opportunity to reapply after one year. The percent reimbursement is based on business.

Some eligible expenses for an SBIF Grant include: New windows, floors or roof; sign removal and replacement; tuck pointing; new heating, ventilation and air conditioning; improvements to accommodate disabled patrons or workers. For more information on SBIFs visit: www.somercor.com/sbif/

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


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CAPS Report

Sergeant Kristen Barker is back as our CAPS officer. Welcome back to Sergeant Barker. Commander Melissa A. Staples, the new commander of the 17th District, also attended the meeting.

Specific West Walker Issues Discussed at April 20, 2011 CAPS Meeting for Beat #1723:

- There were reports of loud, raucous activity at a building on the south side of the 3700 block of Montrose (and alley). If you happen to experience such activity, please call 911 and provide as much information as possible.
- Sgt. Barker reported that a community member had registered a concern relating to vehicles speeding and a number of accidents (including one in which the vehicle ended up on the parkway and sidewalk) at the intersection of Harding and Belle Plaine. The 17th District will have officers monitor that intersection from time to time.

As always, call 911 to report suspicious activity or individuals in your neighborhood and provide a detailed physical description of the individuals involved in any incident, including clothing, shoes and vehicle descriptions.

39th Ward Report

The kick-off to the inaugural activities is a day of service on Saturday, May 14, from 9 a.m. – noon, when residents will come together to conduct service activities throughout the city. Locations in the 39th Ward include Eugene Field Park,

LaBagh Woods and Gompers Park. A free, family-friendly concert featuring the band Chicago will take place at Butler Field on Saturday, May 14, from 1-4 p.m.

The Mayor, City Clerk, City Treasurer, and the City Council will be sworn in on Monday, May 16, 9:30 a.m. at Millennium Park. Following the inauguration, Mayor Emanuel will host an open house in City Hall, in his office on the fifth floor, from 2–4 p.m. All events are free and open to the public. People are asked to register for the Day of Service activities and tickets are required for the free concert.

Vote for Three Brothers Garden!

Vote early and often has taken on new meaning for Three Brothers Garden. The garden is competing with 14 other community gardens from around the country in an online voting competition. Three Brothers Garden, which is co-sponsored by Carlson Community Services and Irving Park Lutheran Church, was chosen in January by Organic Gardening Magazine to compete for a total of \$20,000 to be awarded by DeLoach Vineyards to the top five vote getters. Each garden submitted a three minute video which tells the garden's story and explains how the \$4,000 in grant money will be used.

Three Brothers Garden volunteer Jose Osorio created the video from footage he shot over the garden's two year history. Carlson executive director Liz Mills and Irving Park Community Food Pantry's John Psiharis are featured in the video. The video was shot at both the garden and the food pantry.



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In early April, garden volunteers prepped the garden's raised beds and planted them with spring vegetables.

The video is posted at www.deloachcommunitygardens. com. Voting is easy and requires just a name and e-mail address. Anyone 21 and over can vote for the garden on a daily basis through August 1st. A link to the video can be shared via Facebook. Three Brothers Garden is currently in third place.

"It's really important for us to maintain a solid lead," said Mills. "With three months left in the competition, we don't want our supporters to get complacent. If we win, we'll use the money for solar lighting to extend our growing season, which will enable us to produce even more for the food pantry. There's a lot at stake, so please vote," she said.

The garden is located at 4107 N. Pulaski. Since 2009, over 1,300 pounds of fresh vegetables have been distributed to pantry clients. 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Building Good Garden Soil

Every experienced gardener knows the secret to a great garden is building good organic soil. Even if you are lucky enough to have started with a garden of rich soil, over time you will need to add compost and manure to keep it that way. Natural or organic fertilizer, if required, is used only during the growing cycle to boost plants that need it.

There are 4 basic soil types: clay, silt, sand and loam. Mostly, in Chicago, we have clay soils.

Clay: is the smallest of particles. Clay is smooth when dry and sticky when wet. Soils high in clay content are called heavy soils. Clay also can hold a lot of nutrients, but doesn't let air and water through it well. Although clay may be hard to work with, the high nutrient levels make it good for building up.

Organic amendments include sphagnum peat, wood chips, grass clippings, straw, compost, manure, biosolids, sawdust and wood ash. Inorganic amendments include vermiculite, perlite, tire chunks, pea gravel and sand.

Compost and manure can be worked into the soil, or layered on top, and earthworms, over time, will turn it over.

If you can make your own compost from garden and kitchen waste, that's great! I also have a worm bin, for kitchen scraps. The material they make can be used on indoor and outdoor plants, and containers. Don't forget, also, to change out soil in containers from time to time.


