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
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News from Irving Park Community Food Pantry

Thanks to All for Holiday Help to the Pantry!



All of us at the Irving Park Community Food Pantry would like to thank our neighbors who helped make our annual holiday distribution on Decenber 21st

Volunteers continue a Pantry tradition by joining hands before opening for the holiday distribution to say a prayer of thanks, and the chance to help neighbors in need.

December 21 such a success. The Pantry gave a special distribution of a holiday dinner (featuring Cornish hen, chicken or turkey, depending on the size of the family plus all the trimmings) to an estimated 385 households consisting of more than 1,300 family members.

We also allowed clients with children to shop our "Gift Room" of donated toys to provide a toy and book for more than 380 kids. Your efforts ensured that our neighbors and all of their children were able to celebrate the holiday in ways that we may take for granted.

Those activities followed a big month in November, when the Pantry served 2,160 people in 781 households. Those numbers represented 254 more people in 99 more households than we served in October. Clearly, the need continues to grow in our neighborhood due to the

Did you know that the northwest side of Chicago has a larger than average percentage of older adults staying in their homes? This area is a Naturally Occurring Retirement Community (NORC). The Northwest Side Housing Center work with the older population and the agencies that serve them to develop leadership and creative solutions to the challenges facing this population. This includes access to transportation, affordable housing and other services that can help them "stay put" in the community.

Are you looking for ways to get involved in your community? Would you like to join other mature adults in making your neighborhood a better place to live? A group of energetic, northwest side older adults meet monthly to work on issues that will improve the community and help them live independently.

Come to our next "Staying Put" Leadership Meeting, which will be on Tuesday, January 17th at 10 a.m. (always the third Tuesday of every month) at Mather's More than a Cafe, located on 3235 N. Central. We are working on doorto-door transportation for seniors on the northwest side as well as a senior-teen link program that would help seniors "stay put" in the neighborhood. The Northwest Side Housing Center (NWSHC) is a 501(c) (3), nonprofit organization aming to meet the needs of the residents of the northwest side. 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Seanachai Theatre's Next Play Opens in Less Than 11 Weeks

Mark your calendars: March 15-April 22. Seanachai Theatre is preparing its production of this season's second play, A Moon for the Misbegotten which will be performed Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings and Sunday afternoons. If you love theatre, do not miss Seanachai's March 22nd dinner-theatre evening where you will enjoy a delicious dinner in an intimate setting as well as an educational interaction with the director and actors before and after the play. There is nothing like this experience anywhere else in the city!

The play **A Moon for the Misbegotten** (a sequel to **Long Day's Journey into Night**) is the last play Eugene O'Neill (1888-1953) wrote. It was not successful until some years after his 1953 death. The play is a unique blend of comedy, tragedy, autobiography, and imagination and has been recognized as one of O'Neill's greatest theatrical achievements. O'Neill is considered to be the father of American drama. He was awarded the Noble Prize for Literature and four times was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for Drama.

The director Kevin Theis has been an director, actor, producer, and writer in Chicago for over 20 years. He began his relationship with Seanachai in 1995 when he directed its second show, The Clearing. Since then, he has directed productions at many Chicago theatres including the Royal George, Greasy Joan & Co, Lifeline, CT20 Ensemble, and Oak Park Festival Theatre. As an actor, Kevin has performed at the Goodman Theatre, Next Theatre, Lifeline, City Lit, Buffalo Theatre, Oak Park Festival Theatre, Peninsula Players, and CT20 Ensemble where he served as artistic director. In addition, Kevin is a founding member of Shanghai Low Theatricals, a group of crafts people engaged in the development of literary adaptations for, but not limited to, the stage. Renowned Chicago actor Brad Armacost has appeared in performances at Chicago Shakespeare, Goodman, Steppenwolf, Northlight, Organic/Touchstone, Remy Bumppo, Royal George, Provision. Film credits include *Repetition, The Company, Eight Men Out, Backwoods,* and *Barbershop 2.* Television credits include *The Untouchables, Early Edition, Missing Persons,* and *Angel Street.* Brad has appeared as the narrator with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra's *The Rite of Spring and Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme.* He is currently performing in *Elizabeth Rex* which runs through January 22 at Chicago Shakespeare Company.

Steve Pickering is an award-winning actor, designer, and playwright who has lived and worked in Chicago for over two decades. He is a founding member and project manager for Shanghai Low. Steve has been artistic director of Next Theatre and artistic associate for the Organic Theatre. He began adapting literary works in 1990 with Lewis Carroll's The Hunting of The Snark for Next Lab. Steve has performed on Broadway, Off-Broadway, in London's West End, and over 30 productions at Goodman. He completed over 700 performances of Robert Falls' Tony Award-winning Goodman production of Death of A Salesman with Brian Dennehy. Steve just completed his critically-acclaimed production of St. Nicholas by Conor McPherson here at Seanachai.

Carolyn Klein has been a member of Seanachai's ensemble since 2008. She played Agnes in Dancing at Lughnasa produced by Seanachai in February 2010. Carolyn is both an actor and a director. Her other Chicago credits include work with Chicago Shakespeare, Next Theatre, Strawdog Theatre, Profiles Theatre, and The Hypocrites. She holds a BFA from Western Michigan University and an MFA in Acting from Indiana University-Bloomington.

CICS-IP is very proud to have been ranked number one among CPS Charter Schools for the percentage of students in grades 3rd-8th passing the Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) with test scores that met or exceeded state standards. Articles published in the Chicago Tribune and Sun-Times on November 30th showed we had 92.5% of our students at that level.
