I HAVE RECEIVED MANY QUESTIONS about the apparent increase in crime, especially violent crime, in the past few weeks. Just in the last 30 days, there have been several shootings along Irving Park, at Avondale, Keystone and Kimball, as well as a robbery of a young woman by gunpoint at Avers and Irving Park.

I have been in communication with Alderman Laurino's office, and they have agreed to coordinate a speaker for our WWCA general meeting on May 21 at the Latvian Center. At this time, we are expecting either a 17th District representative, a representative from the Alderman's office, or both. Because of the short notice, more details will be sent out via the WWCA e-mail blast and posted on the WWCA website ahead of the meeting. Please plan to attend. Also, please attend the Beat 1723 CAPS meeting on May 15. Details are in the calendar. Involvement is the best way to increase awareness and the attention of the Chicago Police. Try to attend both meetings, and stay safe.

2. Mike Webber reported on the proposed Disney II Magnet High School and Thurgood Marshall Middle School developments.

Native varieties of perennials, trees and shrubs and rain barrels are eligible for rebates through a City of Chicago program. In addition, the "impatiens downy mildew" affecting the Chicago land area was discussed. This highly destructive disease is spreading rampantly through the City, and has caused many plant sellers to stop selling impatiens. Alternant species, including native perennials covered by the rebate program, are available. Visit your local garden center to learn more.

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Peace in a Diverse World

We have hopes and dreams for the children we love. Recent events where children have been the victims of violence remind us of the fragility of life, even for children whom we would normally feel had their whole lives before them. Recent events have horrified us not only because senseless violence shocks us, but also because these episodes occurred in places where we would think that our children would be safe.

When we reflect on the fragility of life and the unsafe nature of our world, it is far too easy to become protective of our own beliefs and values, to close ourselves off from those we perceive to be different, and allow our fear to have a polarizing effect on our very diverse culture. That is a natural response – but there may be a better one.

What if we learn more about different cultures? What if we work to build friendships with our neighbors and around the world? Safety grows in communities where difference is respected and relationships are built on mutual respect. I like the stories about *peace children* – children exchanged between tribes to learn to love a people different from their own and taught to lead so that there would be peace between groups. This idea has worked in Ireland, Africa and in the Middle East.

Our summer focus at Irving Park United Methodist Church will be on making friends and developing relationships all over the world. Our Vacation Bible School will give us a taste of Japan, Zimbabwe, Great Britain, and Australia (June 24-28 and free). In worship, we will hear from foreign exchange students and learn to build bridges of understanding. We will work with our youth and children in neighborhood projects to build stronger relationships, and we'll visit different faith communities to help us grow in our understanding of each other. We intend to teach our children that differences can enrich our lives and relationships.

We need more peace children in our troubled world – children who will listen, understand, be open to people with different ideas and cultures, and encourage rather than fear those whose language and culture are different from their own. If your faith or community group is working on something similar, please let us know. And know that whoever you are, you are not only welcome – you are honored and celebrated for who you are with us. Together, we can build a world that is safer and more vibrant with diversity, respect and appreciation.

Dear West Walker Residents:

Residents of the 39th Ward were especially hard hit by the recent rains and flooding. Although Albany Park residents were most affected by the flooding, many West Walker residents experienced flood related issues as well. I recommend that

all residents document flood damage – take pictures and keep receipts. It is also important to file claims with your insurance company, even if you don't think flood damage is covered under your policy. This documentation will be invaluable when and if federal funds become available to help residents.

The weather emergency underscores the importance of communication. I encourage residents to sign up with NotifyChicago, a free city service that provides residents with recorded telephone, text, and/or e-mail alerts on everything from traffic to weather emergencies to hazardous materials situations. To receive NotifyChicago alert messages, log onto www.alertchicago.org to create an account.

Secretary of State Jesse White's office maintains an emergency contact database that allows residents to enter emergency contact information, as well as disability/special needs information. In an emergency where you are unable to communicate, law enforcement can access this information and notify your designated emergency contacts, as well as provide any helpful information to emergency medical personnel at the scene. Save the date! The City Clerk's Office will be conducting city sticker sales at my 39th Ward Public Service Office, 4404 W. Lawrence, on Monday, June 24, from 12-6 p.m. For the first time, the City Clerk will be requiring your vehicle identification number before you can purchase your sticker. If you do not have the number on your city sticker renewal, or if you don't receive the renewal form, please bring proof of your vehicle's identification number. Your insurance card, state registration card, or car title will have the VIN number printed on it.

Dog Bite Prevention Program to Work with Irving Park YMCA



The Irving Park YMCA on Chicago's Northwest side is hosting a dog bite prevention seminar at two different times on Friday, May 31st. Central Bark Doggy Day Care will conduct this very important program to children of all age levels. Children will be taught what signs to look for in an

aggressive dog and focus on what to do if a strange dog approaches a child on the street and even how to approach a dog that is familiar to them.

"Little known facts about dog bites are that children are more likely than adults to be bitten by a dog. In fact, they are more likely to be bitten in the face and to require medical attention more often than an adult. We are trying to get out there and inform children on the do's and don'ts of dog interaction and keeping children safe around dogs," says Central Bark owner, Bonnie Lemperis.

Lemperis and her Dog Bite Prevention crew will be conducting this very important and educational seminar on Friday, May 31 at 10 a.m. for preschoolers and 5 p.m. for older kids. at The Irving Park YMCA located at 4251 W. Irving Park Road. All children in attendance will receive coloring and puzzle sheets to reinforce what they learned.

Chicago native Bonnie Lemperis has been a passionate dog owner since she was a young girl. She has fostered dogs for a variety of animal rescue organizations throughout the state, has been trained in dog behavior, and is even certified in pet first-aid. 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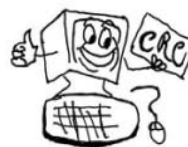

Pantry Receives Major SNAP Grant

The Irving Park Community Food Pantry has received a one-time allocation of food credits from the Greater Chicago Food Depository for \$8,700. The grant resulted from our on-going work with GCFD as a member of the SNAP Outreach Community Partners Network. Each week, our volunteers help clients apply online for SNAP benefits, with approximately 10 to 15 households being accepted each month. We helped so many people with the program that we qualified for this special one-time grant.

This surprise funding will be a huge help in meeting our annual budget goals as food costs continue to rise and our client base expands. Thanks to Steven McCullough, GCFD vice president of community partnerships, for facilitating this allocation for us and to Community Services Coordinator Belma Torres, who oversees the SNAP processing operation.

Thank you to the Roundy's Foundation, the charitable arm of Roundy's Supermarkets, owners of the Mariano's Fresh Markets chain, for including the Pantry in its annual donations to food pantries. The group donated \$500 and a pallet of 2,595 pounds of food to our cause in April. This is the seventh year that the Foundation has donated to food pantries in its communities in Illinois and Wisconsin and the second year the Pantry has been included as the program expands.

Thanks to the Old Irving Park Association (OIPA) for making a \$500 donation to the Pantry to give us a boost

during April, when we were participating in the Alan Shawn Feinstein Foundation Challenge. Money raised during March and April counted toward our total, which helped us gain more of the \$1 million the Foundation is giving away nationwide to food pantries based on their contributions during these two months.

Executive Director John Psiharis has been invited to serve on a newly created Agency Advisory Council created by GCFD. The council will provide insights and feedback on operations and programs to make them more efficient and effective.

We want to say goodbye to a longtime volunteer, OIP resident Jay Skilton, who was named Volunteer of the Year in 2012. Jay, who is leaving the area, has volunteered at the pantry for six years, running the distribution line, serving on the board, and representing the Pantry with Three Brothers Garden.

To be eligible for the lottery, students must have minimum stanines of 5 in both reading and math on their 7th grade ISATs (or another acceptable standardized test). Students with an IEP or 504 Plan must have seventh grade reading and math stanines that equal at least 10.

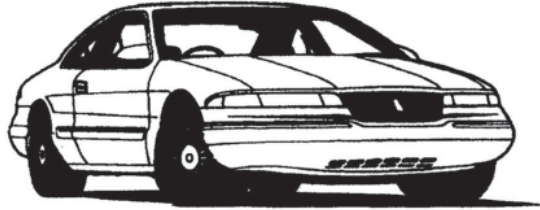
