New Policy Regarding Vehicle Registration Email Notices

Due to the lack of a state budget, the Secretary of State's office is suspending the mailing of vehicle registration renewal reminder notices. By suspending this service, which will save approximately \$450,000 per month, the office will be able to prolong the ability to mail vehicle registration renewal stickers, titles and license plates to vehicle owners for a few months longer before the postage account is depleted. Vehicle owners are encouraged to be mindful of their vehicle registration status. Motorists can sign up to receive reminder notices electronically by email by visiting www.cyberdriveillinois.com. You will need your registration ID and pin (located on your Illinois Registration Identification Card).

New Rules for Recycling

Starting January 1st, recycleables must be placed loose in blue carts.

"Everyone wants to do their part to help protect the environment, but when you put the wrong items in the blue cart - like a plastic bag - you contaminate not only your cart but a whole stream of otherwise useful materials," Streets & San commissioner Charles Williams said.

Plastic bags damage equipment at sorting facilities and also keep workers from seeing whether other non-recyclables - like pizza boxes or Styrofoam - have been placed in the cart. Streets & San incurs additional costs when non-recyclables have to be hauled from a sorting facility to a landfill.

Because so many people remain confused about what can and can't be recycled, Streets & San is preparing to debut a new website - Recycle by City Chicago - that will clear up misconceptions and provide a better visual representation of how to recycle correctly.

Fifth District Participates in Congressional App Challenge

U.S. Representative Mike Quigley (IL-05) announced that Illinois' Fifth District will be participating in the second annual Congressional App Challenge (CAC), a congressional initiative to improve student engagement in coding and computer science.

High school students will create and submit their own original "apps" to be judged by panels of local judges. Submission deadline is January 15, 2016. Members of Congress will announce the winners on February 22, 2016. Winners will be honored by their Member of Congress and have their apps featured on a display in the Capitol building.

The CAC was created because Congress recognized that STEM skills are essential for economic growth and innovation, and that the U.S. has been falling behind on these fronts. STEM occupations are projected to grow by 17 percent between 2008 and 2018, compared to 9.8 percent growth for non-STEM occupations. According to some estimates, the U.S. may be short as many as three million high-skilled workers by 2018. To maintain American competitiveness, it's crucial that the United States invests in our youth now, and helps them acquire these necessary STEM-based skills. The CAC highlights and encourages students to pursue those skills.

In its first year, the CAC received submissions from students in 84 districts. This year, the Challenge is striving to double that number. Recognizing the racial, gendered, and other disparities in the tech sector, the CAC will also focus on inclusivity and make the Challenge as accessible as possible to people from all backgrounds.

The Internet Education Foundation will be serving as the operational "sponsor" of the CAC. For further information about the Congressional App Challenge, please visit www.congressionalappchallenge.us/.

In 2014, Rep. Quigley presented Trushitha Narla as the winner of the Congressional App Challenge for Illinois' Fifth Congressional District with her app, Sign It! Her app translates numbers in sign language to a text format using leap motion technology that captures data from the user's finger motions.

8 Ways to Super Size a Small Kitchen

The holidays are here which means more people in your kitchen. Here are some tips to make your kitchen look and feel bigger.

- 1. Let the light in. Keep your window treatments simple or eliminate them. Hang glass pendent lighting to keep sight lines open in the room.
- 2. **Go with light colors** and keep the walls, cabinets and appliances in the same color family.
- 3. **Declutter** the countertops. Hang utensils. Put knives on a magnetic strip. Hang storage racks on the inside of cabinet doors.
- 4. Use open or glass shelving to give the illusion of more space. Replace cabinet doors with glass front doors.
- 5. **Paint** your top cabinets **a light color** and a slightly darker color for the bottom. Paint the walls the same color as the top cabinets.
- 6. **Choose small furniture** petite island, slim chairs, open back chairs...Use a rolling cart when you need more counter space.
- 7. Use geometric patterns on the floor tile to elongate the room. Or add a patterned runner for the same effect.
- 8. Think shiny and reflective. Shiny appliances (stainless or white), glass tiles...

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CAPS Report

Beat 1722 & 1723 CAPS Meeting November 18, 2015

Present: Beat facilitators Martha Hack & Carla Elliott, 2 Beat officers, CAPS Officer Maryjane Parks, Representatives from the offices of Ald. Carlos Ramirez-Rosa (35) and Ald. Margaret Laurino (39).

Officer Parks reported that a minor residing in the 4000 block of Hamlin was placed on "intense supervision" at his November 10th court date. In addition, he is required to perform community service hours. He is no longer on home confinement.

At 1:05 a.m. on November 10th, a male victim exited his vehicle behind his residence on the 4100 Block of Elston. Two subjects approached the victim from behind and pointed a handgun into his back, forced the victim back into his own vehicle and drove away with the victim. This was observed through the window of the residence, by the victim's wife who called 9-1-1. The offenders drove around with the victim for an hour and used his Debit Card at an ATM. The victim was released at the Citibank at Devon/California, which is where the offenders used the ATM Debit Card. The victim was not injured.

- > Trust your instincts. IF you feel uncomfortable in a place or situation, leave right away and get help if necessary.
- > Call 911 for anything suspicious. Note description flight and vehicle, if any.

The city's 102nd Christmas Tree begins a new tradition this holiday season in Millennium Park near the intersection of Michigan Ave. and Washington Street.

Also in Millennium Park, the McCormick Tribune Ice Rink opened on November 13 and remains open until March 6, 2016, weather permitting. Located on Michigan Avenue between Washington and Madison Streets, the rink is free and open to the public, and skate rental is only \$12.

With winter comes snow, and many people rely on walking and transit as their primary way to get around. Without a wide, clear path through snow and ice, it is especially difficult for people with disabilities, seniors and children to walk safely. Please remember that it is the responsibility of homeowners and occupants to remove snow and ice from the sidewalks according to the Municipal Code of Chicago.

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Three Brothers Garden Grows 828 lbs. of Vegetables for Food Pantry

Three Brothers Garden closed the 2015 growing season with a whopping yield of 828 lbs. of vegetables. Now in its seventh year of operation, the garden is a partnership between Carlson Community Services and Irving Park Lutheran Church. Vegetables grown in Three Brothers Garden are distributed to clients of the Irving Park Community Food Pantry. This past season we grew radishes, lettuces, kale, Swiss chard, carrots, peppers, cucumbers, tomatoes, beets, herbs and green beans. In planning what to grow, the volunteer committee that oversees the garden considers nutritional value and ease of preparation for food pantry clients. Since 2009, over 5,500 lbs. of vegetables have been grown for the Food Pantry.


Volunteers began working in the garden in mid-April and gardened through early November. Over 275 volunteer hours were logged, including harvesting, planting, clean-up and watering. Between 8 and 10 volunteers participated each week in the Tuesday night harvests. Regular volunteers included Melanie Reschke, Martha Sanders, Judy Madsen, Darcie Wadycki, Rebecca and Elmer Haneberg, Ellen and Ron Olech, Ruth Olech, Kirsten Gettings and Erin Bouman. During the month of July, five students from Schurz High School's BuildOn program participated in the harvests. Volunteers were led by college intern Alexandra Madsen. Alex oversaw the weekly harvests, delivered vegetables to the food pantry and tracked the number of hours volunteers worked and pounds of vegetables grown.

Pantry Celebrates Holidays December 16th

The Irving Park Community Food Pantry will hold its annual holiday distribution for clients on Wednesday, December 16th. At this event each year, we close the Pantry to our typical Wednesday operation and provide our qualified clients with the makings of a holiday dinner. We also allow those clients with children up to 12 years old to "shop" our Toy Room for a gift and a book for each of them.

To fill these needs, we are especially in need of stuffing, cranberry sauce, canned yams and vegetables, instant potatoes, cake mixes, Jell-O and canned pumpkin. For traditional food drives, we also are in need of dry goods, such as peanut butter, macaroni & cheese, hamburger helper-type meals (such as rice-a-roni and pasta-roni), whole-grain crackers, dried fruit and nuts, dry soup mixes, energy bars and juice (100% fruit juice). We always are in need of toiletries of all types.

We typically give out about 400 toys or so to clients. For some, it will be the only gift they receive, and those kids who are able to come in to pick out their own gift are very excited and happy to receive one. Your donations ensure clients' children can talk about their special presents with their friends who receive so much more. This year, we will not be receiving support from Toys for Tots, as we have in the past due to the amount of confidential information about recipients they now require. At press time, we're happy to say that we've received a lot of toy donations, and we thank you for your support!

We'd like to thank Sara Yoest for coordinating the toy program this year. Volunteers are needed to collect toys, set up the toy room Tuesday night and help with the toy distribution on December 16. For information or to volunteer, contact Sara at sara.yoest74@gmail.com.

Many of the children's socks will be given away with our Holiday distribution, as we receive fewer requests for those. Men's white crew socks are especially useful, as men and women both like those for use year-round.

The Cultivating Growth Community Herb Garden by the Pantry's front door has yielded several hundred baggies of fresh herbs (basil, oregano, cilantro, thyme, parsley, mint, rosemary and sage) that have been distributed to clients each week immediately after harvest. Special thanks to Liz Mills, Executive Director of Carlson Community Services and the Three Brothers Community Garden, for her invaluable assistance and advice for this project. Thanks also to Vicci Rodgers, Rev Lowell Allen and Molly Melick for their efforts in maintaining the garden.
