How's the Real Estate Market?

Hi Neighbors! I get asked how the real estate market is almost every day. Short answer—good!

The job market is strong and unemployment is very low at 3.4% (historically the average is 5.7%). Even with mortgage rates increasing from 3.5% to 6.5%, there are many buyers looking for homes. Most buyers realize rates will drop in about a year or so and then they can refinance. Some are buying down the rate for a year or two to lower their monthly payment until they refinance.

There is still a shortage of homes for sale so buyer demand is exceeding supply. In May 2022, there were 57 homes for sale in Irving Park. In May 2023 there are only 25 homes for sale.

In West Walker, my clients are receiving multiple offers and their homes are selling at 103% of asking price in about a week.

Here are some average West Walker sales stats:

Single-family home \$577,000 Multi-family 2–4 units \$638,000 Condo—2-bedroom \$196,000

Keep in mind these are averages. Sale prices will vary depending on the number of bedrooms/baths, size of the home, home improvements, lot size, etc.

Seeking Donations to Support Migrants & Refugees Coming to Chicago

Donate diapers, suitcases, large bags and backpacks through July 9. As Chicago continues to respond to a large influx of migrants and refugees, and as IPLC is in touch with community organizations coordinating support for them, one thing that is always needed: disposable diapers. Also, as families and individuals are being moved from place to place, many have only plastic bags to transport and store things they're being given. Suitcases, large bags and backpacks are also most welcome, and gently used ones are just fine. You could even donate a suitcase full of diapers! Bring your donations of luggage and/or diapers to IPLC any time between now and Sunday, July 9, and we'll deliver them to our partner organizations.

A Focus on Welcome During Pride Month

Pastor Brook Petersen, who served as pastor of IPLC from 2006–2012, went on to write a dissertation: "Religious Trauma: Queer Stories in Engagement and Return." She'll preach in worship on June 18, and afterwards share more about her research and experiences.

Pastor Michael Fick leads a Lutheran congregation in Edgewater that has been Reconciling in Christ (RIC) for decades. (RIC is a designation for Lutheran congregations that explicitly welcome people who are LGBTQIA+ and work to oppose racism and other forms of discrimination.) Pastor Fick will preach in worship on June 25, and afterwards share more about his work and experiences.

CAPS Report

Beats 1722 & 1723 May 17, 2023 Meeting

In attendance: CAPS Officer Miro; John Campos, CPD Community Organizer; Alderman Samantha Nugent and Samantha Brewer (39th); Joe Engleman (33rd Ward office)

Officer Miro started the meeting by inviting Ald. Nugent (39th) to speak since she had another meeting to attend. The Alderman is sponsoring a shredding and recycling event on June 17 from 9–11 am at St. Edward's Church, 4350 W. Sunnyside. They will also accept prescriptions for safe disposal. The Alderman addressed the migrant crisis and talked about Mayor Johnson's inauguration. Alderpersons are awaiting committee assignments.

Officer Miro went over some crime stats from Beat 1723 (all of West Walker is in Beat 1723). Motor vehicle thefts, especially Hyundais and Kias, continue to be an issue, as well as catalytic converter thefts. A 15-year-old gang member was shot and killed at Leland and Central Park. Residents questioned what is being done to get kids out of gangs. Joe Engleman (33rd Ward office) stated that violence interrupters are at work in the 33rd Ward and that programs and events for young people are being organized, including something for Memorial Day weekend. The purpose of violence interrupters is to diffuse conflicts. Officer Miro stated that every day a deployment box is established to focus on areas of concern. In the past three weeks, 100 investigative stop reports were made in the deployment box, resulting in 120 arrest and 6 arrests for weapons violations.

A resident inquired about a shooting at Montrose and Lawndale. Residents are urged to submit photos of graffiti with gang tags to the CAPS office at CAPS.017district@chicagopolice.org, as well as calling 311.

The Pet Fair sponsored by the 17th District was a big success. Pets were microchipped and vaccinated.

Call 911 to report suspicious activity or individuals in your neighborhood and provide detailed descriptions of the individuals and vehicles involved in any incident. Even if a neighbor has already reported the incident or activity, other neighbors should make separate calls. The police rely on the number of calls for service in determining the allocation of officers to a district.

Remember to always lock your vehicle; never leave it running unattended. Be on the lookout for scams related to income tax refunds. Remember, the IRS will never call you on the phone. The next meeting will be on Wednesday, June 21 at 6:30 pm in the 17th District Community Room, 4650 N. Pulaski.

Filament Theatre Announces 2023 Cohort of SPARK Artistsin-Residence

Equity, Innovation and Play were some of the themes explored by Filament Theatre's latest team of youth curators as they selected the 2023 cohort of SPARK artists.

It's the innovative SPARK program's third year, bringing together a group of 3rd- through 8th-graders who collaborated with Filament Artistic Directors Molly Bunder and Reji Simon to learn the curation process during five workshops focused on art-making, new work development and the important role that curators play in creating more equitable and diverse arts programming.

"SPARK youth curators... select new artists for our theatreartists they know fellow young people will be excited to see. They make bold, thoughtful selections..." says Molly Bunder, Artistic Director for Creative Partnerships. "Through SPARK, we allow our young people to directly influence the future of our organization."

The three artists chosen by the curators are paid employees during their terms, with access to Filament Theatre's 4,000 square-foot flexible venue in Portage Park. With creative and administrative support from Filament's staff, artistic network and youth support teams, the artists can use their six-week residency at Filament however they choose–fully completing a project or making progress toward a longer-term goal. Each SPARK residency culminates in a final presentation.

Spring 2023 SPARK Artist-in-Residence: Osiris Cuen, aka Cuentinflas, is an Indigenous, Latine and Disabled performance artist. You may know them from their solo show, *The Rebirth of Osiris* with Haven Theatre Company, their role as "Gabby Orozco" in Arizona Theatre Company's production of *American Mariachi*, or their five years of work with Childsplay, Arizona's premier theatre for young audiences, including *Alice's Rock and Roll Adventures in Wonderland, The Yellow Boat, Smartest Girl in the World, Girls Who Wear Glasses, Super Cowgirl* and *Mighty Miracle*. They graduated from Arizona State University with a BA in Theatre.

Osiris lives in the Pilsen neighborhood of Chicago where they are a frequent collaborator with Pilsen Arts & Community House, hosting *Hora de Cuentinflas*: A Spanish Immersive Drag Storytime. Instagram: @Cuentinflas

Summer 2023 SPARK Artist-in-Residence: Abby **Thompson** is Chicago-based Emmy award-winning voiceover artist for her narration of a program promotion campaign for a PBS documentary series about Muhammad Ali. She is also an actor, educator, arts advocate and dreamer. She has a passion for community engagement, collaboration and connection amongst artists, and incorporating life skills from the arts to groups otherwise unfamiliar with theater, including incarcerated youth, youth in the foster care system, scientists and technologists. Abby is particularly interested in the intersection between the arts, sciences, faith, spirituality, social justice and diversity. Some of her favorite mediums include theater for social justice, immersive theater, animation, mixed-race theater, devised theater and youth-centered theater. She is currently the Dreamer in Chief for Northlight Theatre's youth Speak Up Summit devised teaching artist performance.

Abby has taught and facilitated theater with Filament Theatre, Chicago Children's Theatre, Steppenwolf Theatre, Northlight Theatre, Storycatchers Theatre and Collaboraction and performed with First Stage Children's Theater, Filament Theatre, Milwaukee Repertory Theatre and African American Children's Theatre. Fall 2023 SPARK Artist-in-Residence: Phanésia Pharel is a playwright who grew up on a dragon fruit farm in Miami. Poison Ivy in the City? You Bet!

A recent walk in the neighborhood found some interesting vines creeping onto walkways mostly via fences. Could it be...POISON IVY? It sure was! Before you start to itch, let's identify this nuisance plant so you can get it out of your backyard.

Leaves of 3-Let It Be!

Poison ivy can grow as a woody shrub but it is generally found as a vine running along the ground, growing on trees and



shrubs and even on landscape features such as fences and rock walls and borders. This creeping vine uses aerial rootlets to attach itself to plants and structures.

Poison ivy is identified by the presence of 3 leaflets arranged alternately on a stem-never an opposite arrangement. Leaves can be shiny or dull, often with pointed tips and edges sometimes smooth but often with a few coarse notches (though not serrated). Green summer leaves turn red in the fall.

Don't Touch! And Never Ever Burn!

All parts of the poison ivy plant contain an oily compound called urushiol. Skin inflammation, rash, itching and/or blistering can occur when urushiol comes in contact with skin or is inhaled. This oil can get on tools, pets and clothing, which can then be transferred to your skin. It can be inhaled as a gas if the plant is burned. It can even last over a year on dead plants.

Controlling Poison Ivy in Your Landscape

The safest and most effective method of removing poison ivy is with an herbicide application of glyphosate, 2, 4-D or tripclopyr. Ideally, young plants should be treated in the spring on a warm, sunny day when there's no wind or rain in the forecast. Plants can also be treated in fall when night temperatures fall. Please make sure to read and follow the directions on any herbicide you purchase, or consult your local garden center for more information.

Wash ASAP

If you do come in contact with poison ivy, make sure to wash your hands and any other skin contact points with soapy water as soon as possible. Your clothes and towels will also need to be washed. Tools that come in contact with poison ivy should also be cleaned with soapy water. Once poison ivy is removed from your landscape, you'll find your gardening experience much more enjoyable. Happy gardening!
