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Kidical Mass: Family Bike Rides

Join Irving Park Kidical Mass for a slow, easy-going and fun group ride focused on kids (all ages) and families that will tour the Irving Park neighborhood.

We'll meet at the Independence Park playground, near the corner of Byron and Hamlin, between 10-10:25 am for a 10:30 am departure.

2024 Dates: Sundays, May 19, June 9, July 14, August 11, September 8, October 13, November 10, December 8. Rides will be held rain or shine from May through October, and will be weather dependent in November and December. Each ride will end at a fun destination in the community such as a nature play area, neighborhood park or forest preserve.

Ride Guidelines

- · Please wear helmets and ride safely.
- Rides are typically 2–4 miles at a 5–6 mph pace, 1 hour with stops.
- Suitable for children who have progressed beyond training wheels.
- Younger children are welcome on trail-a-bikes, child trailers or child seats on their parent/guardian's bike.
 Festive dress and decorations encouraged.
- It is expected that all kids bring a parent or guardian with a bike.

What Is the Home Mortgage Interest Tax Deduction?

The mortgage interest deduction lets you subtract an amount of interest you pay on your mortgage from your taxable income and lowers your overall taxes owed. You can deduct interest on a loan related to building, buying or improving your primary and second home and possibly interest on rental properties. But there are limits; mostly based on when you took out the mortgage.

Homes sold before October 13, 1987

These mortgages are grandfathered in. You can deduct all the interest from your taxable income.

Homes sold October 13, 1987 to December 16, 2017 You can deduct the interest on the first \$1 million of your mortgage if you are single or married filing jointly. If you are married filing separately, you can deduct interest on \$500,000.

Homes sold before April 1, 2018

If you had a contract to purchase your home before December 15, 2017, and purchased before April 1, 2018, may qualify to deduct interest on the first \$1 million. If you are married and file separately, you can deduct interest on \$500,000.

Homes sold on or after April 1, 2018

You can deduct interest on the first \$750,000 of your mortgage if you are single or married filing jointly. The limit is \$375,000 if you are married filing separately.

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CAPS Report

Beat 1723

April 17, 2024 Meeting

In attendance: CAPS Officer Miro; John Campos, CPD Community Organizer; Ald. Samantha Nugent & Mark Gameng (39th Ward)

CAPS Officer Miro welcomed everyone to the meeting. Ald. Samantha Nugent spoke first about the 39th Ward's Clean & Green and Earth Day initiatives. Street sweeping started April 1. No parking signs should be posted several days ahead of street sweeping. A shredding event will be held May 4 at Trinity Lutheran Church, 5106 N. LaCrosse.

Officer Miro reviewed the top ten crimes in Beat 1723 for the last month. There were 20 batteries, mostly simple and domestic; 11 thefts, which were mostly retail and catalytic converter thefts; 10 assaults; 6 deceptive practices; 5 criminal damage and 5 burglaries; 3 motor vehicle thefts; 2 robberies; 2 weapons violations; and 2 incidents of criminal trespass.

Burglaries: On March 24 tools were stolen from a construction site in the 4000 block of N. Pulaski. On April 2 a burglar pried open a door in the 4000 block of

Monticello. A couple of arrests have been made in Beatwide burglary cases.

Weapons violations: On April 6 shots were fired in the 3500 block of Leland at 12:10 am. On April 8 at 1:30 pm shots were exchanged on the 4300 block of Lawndale. Multiple shell casings were recovered.

Residents asked about a homicide that occurred on March 17 at 1:30 pm in the 4200 block of Kimball. The victim was sitting on his front porch and was shot by someone in a white CRV. The shooting is believed to be gang-related.

A resident asked about an uptick in crime in the area, citing a car torched March 23 in the 4200 block of N. Kildare, a weapons discharge March 28 in the 4100 block of N. Springfield, shots fired March 31 at Elston & Springfield, and a structure set on fire April 9 in the 4300 block of Lawndale and Monticello.

Officer Miro addressed the resident's concerns by explaining that the homicide on Kimball sparked gang retaliation. A tactical team stopped a vehicle and recovered 5 guns that were perhaps to be used in more retaliative shooting. In all of the 17th District, gang

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

To combat this, Officer Miro said that teams have been doing more traffic stops, and have adjusted their hours to mirror when the shooting has been happening. In answer to a question, Officer Miro said that staffing levels are normal.

The next CAPS meeting for Beat 1723 (covers all of West Walker) is **Wednesday, June 19 at 6:30 pm** in the 17th District Community Room, 4650 N. Pulaski.

Call 911 to report suspicious activity or individuals in your neighborhood and provide detailed descriptions of the individuals and vehicles involved in any incident. Even if a neighbor has already reported the incident or activity, other neighbors should make separate calls. The police rely on the number of calls for service in determining the allocation of officers to a district. Remember to always lock your vehicle, never leave it running unattended and be on the lookout for scams related to income tax refunds. Remember, the IRS will never call you on the phone.

Pantry Needs Toiletries Donations

Along with its various food stations, the Pantry includes a toiletries station. These essential products are popular with clients, but we often run out. They're hard to source from suppliers at any discount, and our budget can't keep us stocked every week. Therefore, we rely on donations from individuals and organizations to help provide our clients with these items.

We're seeking donations of key basics: toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorant, shampoo, body wash, razors and shaving cream, and other popular items, including body lotion, conditioner, floss, sunscreen, diapers (especially #5 and #6), baby wipes (given to those requesting diapers) and dishwashing liquid.

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Friend or Foe? Why "Cortisol Belly" Fear Is Misguided

When faced with a threat, our bodies react with a surge of cortisol, a hormone that fuels our fight-or-flight response. This happens through various pathways: fight, flee, freeze or appease (people pleasing). While cortisol plays a crucial role in managing stress, it also contributes to blood sugar regulation, immunity and memory. In short, eliminating it would be detrimental to our health.

Recently, the term "cortisol belly" has once again gained traction, referring to fat storage around the midsection associated with *chronically high* cortisol levels. These elevated levels often stem from *prolonged* stress, illness or certain medications.

While the negative impacts of chronic stress are undeniable, the fear surrounding cortisol itself can be an additional stressor. Instead of fearing this vital hormone, we should be investigating the root causes of persistently high stress levels:

• **Work Stress:** Demanding deadlines, toxic work environments and a lack of work-life balance can contribute to chronic stress.

- **Financial Strain:** Worrying about bills, debt and financial instability can be a major stressor.
- **Relationship Issues:** Conflicts, lack of support or unhealthy dynamics within relationships can significantly impact stress levels.
- **Health Concerns:** Dealing with chronic illnesses, injuries or the fear of getting sick can be a constant source of stress.
- **Unrealistic Expectations:** Perfectionism, societal pressure and self-imposed deadlines can lead to overwhelming stress.

Identifying these potential stressors is the first step towards managing cortisol levels effectively. Once you've identified where your chronic stress is coming from, then the power lies in taking action. Exploring various stress-management techniques like mindfulness, exercise, healthy sleep habits and setting realistic boundaries can be key to regulating cortisol levels effectively. This shift in perspective allows you to move beyond the fear mongering and cultivate a healthier relationship with your body, leading to a calmer, more balanced and ultimately, happier you.

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
